Recently, I attended a professional development presentation on leading through "liminal" times. "Liminal" is not a common word — it means a transitional space; literally "crossing over the threshold" ("limin" is a word that means "doorway"). To illustrate, the presenter showed us the image of a trapeze artist suspended in mid-air between the bar she swung out on and the one she has yet to catch.

The Church is flying without a net. How do we travel together and shepherd one another into the "post-pandemic" era when we don't know what's on the other side? When will we say with any certainty that the pandemic is over? What traditions, practices, events and ways of being together will return, and what of those will never go back to the way things were? How do we muster the courage to move into the new life ahead, even as we hang in mid-air *knowing as we must how the vivacity of* what was *is married to the vitality of* what will be?

How did Jesus rise from the grave and step out of the empty tomb into the sun? How did he lead the disciples — still scared, uncertain and weighed down by the fears and doubts of pre-Easter days — into life on the other side of the cross?? How did he organize that traumatized remnant of skeptics and doubters into His church;

into a living, breathing expression of His love for all humankind?

Jesus traveled through a liminal space. Jesus spent three days in the throes of death on the cross and in a dark, lifeless tomb. He went all the way down, and came back up even higher. And so shall we. *I don't say it's easy, but what else will do if the love* we *claim to have for the world be true?*

When Will We Meet for In-Person Worship Again?

This question is one on the hearts and minds of all of us here at First Presbyterian. This is a decision that our Session has discussed and deliberated on. and Grounds The Building and Worship Commissions are offering regular input for Session consideration. The Presbytery of Lake Michigan also provides regular guidance to local congregations on safe reopening. The most recent recommendations from our Presbytery suggest that congregations not consider meeting in person until after the 30th of June but gives local congregations space to make their own plans.

At the March Session meeting the topic of reopening was discussed. It was agreed that Session would continue to revisit this topic each month and that plans be put in place for how we are going to guarantee safety for our worshiping community once we return to in-person worship. Best practice requires many new measures that we are not used to as a church community. Among those new practices recommended by our Presbytery are postponing fellowship hours, the continued use of social distancing and mask wearing, no singing, limited seating, and making increased use of outdoor gatherings for group meetings or worship.

The Apostle Paul encouraged local congregations in the early church. Paul acknowledged the value of meeting together when writing in Romans, "I long to see you so that I may impart to you some spiritual gift to make you strong — that is, that you and I may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith". I am sure we all sense that longing. Our church continues to reach out to members using live stream worship services each Sunday morning. These services are also available for viewing on our <u>web site</u>. Presently we are averaging well over 100 views per week from our live stream or recorded replay options. We know you are still with us in spirit.

At this time an exact date as to when we will be opening our church again for in person worship has not been set. Each month local infection rates, progress in the vaccination program, church readiness plans along with Presbytery recommendations are reviewed.

We are aware that other congregations in our community are starting to meet again. Please know we are keeping the health and safety of all our worship community in mind as we deliberate when we will return to worship. We miss our time together but feel the need to be mindful and prepared before opening up our building. This temporary stop in meeting together is nearly over. Whether we meet in person or not, First Presbyterian continues our commitment to be the "Body of Christ" here in Paw Paw.

We deeply appreciate your concern and patience as we plan for a safe return to inperson worship.

Every year our church sponsors Erick and Loida, children who live at Montaña de Luz in Honduras. Montaña de Luz is a faith-based organization dedicated to empowering children, youth and families affected by HIV/AIDS. They provide shelter, food, clothing, education and attempt to eradicate stigma allowing these children to live happier lives. For the past 20 years Montaña de Luz has been one of the few homes in Honduras dedicated to caring for children impacted by the disease.

Currently 17 children live at the facility. Over 65 children and youth have come to live at Montaña de Luz and receive high quality care and attention. 60% of the people living with HIV/AIDS in Central America are in Honduras which is the second most impoverished country in the Western Hemisphere. The past year has been especially difficult for Montaña de Luz because of the pandemic. Visitors and volunteers have not been allowed at the facility.

Usually every spring we have the "Quarters in a Jar" campaign but because of the pandemic we are unable to do this. So this year we are asking you to send in your donation to the church. We need a total of \$720.00 to sponsor the children. Please make your check out to First Presbyterian Church and on the check's memo line write Montaña de Luz.

Due to your generosity Montaña de Luz has been able to provide this care to the children. Thank you!


Lumm Scholarship Reminder

From "The Sin of Racism - First Read":

While we recognize and honor the work towards justice that has been happening and continues at every level of the PC(USA), we also name that in this time it is not enough. We must become actively anti-racist in our theology, policy, and practice. When our colleagues, siblings, and



neighbors protest in the streets to say that being Black should never be an excuse to be targeted and killed, when so many stand in solidarity to say #BlackLivesMatter, and when our own communities are weighed down in grief and anger, it is the time to stand alongside our Black, Indigenous, and People of Color siblings in voice and in action.

The topic has generated a great deal of attention in recent years and books that will increase your depth of understanding about this controversial subject include <u>Begin Again</u>, <u>Across That Bridge</u>, <u>White Fragility</u>, <u>The Black Church</u>, and <u>Caste</u>. Additionally, the video <u>John Lewis: Good Trouble</u> is recommended. Lewis served in the U.S. House of Representatives for 33 years and worked to end racial segregation across the country.
