Session Wants You to Know

On January 9 a special congregational meeting of our church was held after worship. Since many of our members were not present for the meeting Session feels it is important to keep as many as possible of our extended worship family informed. At that meeting Session brought a motion to dissolve the pastoral relationship with Reverend Tiffany McCafferty. The motion to dissolve was confirmed by members of our congregation who were present. The dissolution of our six year time with Pastor Tiffany comes with a mixture of feelings and Session wishes to share the wording of the motion and what next steps might be. Session asks that all concerned be held in prayer as we proceed to work out details of our dissolution and work with Presbytery to find interim leadership.

Following is the motion with a brief explanation presented to the congregation on January 9:

At our annual duly called Congregational Meeting on November 14, 2021 the congregation voted not to affirm Rev. Tiffany McCafferty's terms of call for 2022, as presented and recommended by the Session. As a result, the Session had a special called meeting on November 18, 2021 in order to consult with the Committee on Ministry of the Lake Michigan Presbytery about next steps. These next steps, as presented by Rev. Jerry Duggins, a Presbytery of Lake Michigan COM representative, were:

Option 1: Call a Congregational Meeting to dissolve the pastoral relationship. Rev. McCafferty's Sabbatical Leave would continue to March 1, 2022 and, per Presbytery COM policy, Rev. McCafferty would be paid a six-month severance from March 1, 2022.

Option 2: Renegotiate the Terms of Call, call another Congregational Meeting and present the revised Terms of Call to the congregation.

Option 3: Do nothing. The present Terms of Call would continue until otherwise negotiated and approved by the congregation.

Given it was the Advent season, the Session chose to remain in prayer and discernment about our three options until our December 14 regular meeting, also understanding that Rev. McCafferty would also be meeting with COM representatives.

On December 9, I, as Clerk of Session, received a letter from Rev. Tiffany McCafferty dated December 8, 2021, which I

then forwarded to the session for consideration and discussion at our December 14, 2021 Session meeting.

The December 8 letter from Rev. McCafferty requested dissolution of the called pastoral relationship with First Presbyterian Church of Paw Paw because "a work environment persists that inhibits effective ministry...".

At the December 14 regular meeting of the session, the Session acted to receive the December 8 letter from Rev. McCafferty and consider the three options presented to us by COM at the November 18 meeting of the Session. After prayer and further conversation, the Session opted to call a special Congregational meeting on January 9, 2022, to dissolve the pastoral relationship with Rev. McCafferty effective March 1, 2022. Following due process and procedure, this was done by publishing announcements at worship services on December 19 and 26, 2021. In addition, three Session Members volunteered to contact Tiffany to offer support and continue conversations about her request.

Tiffany's letter of request for dissolution includes allegations of a hostile work environment, gender discrimination, sexual harassment and lack of respect for pastoral authority. Session is working to understand, investigate and address Rev. McCafferty's allegations. We are not prepared to share the details of the allegations with the congregation without some verification of the allegations and a plan to move forward.


On behalf of the Session, we are asking the congregation to vote on whether to dissolve the pastoral relationship with Rev. Tiffany McCafferty effective March 1, 2022, and a severance agreement will be negotiated.

This is an act of the congregation, and the Session is placing this motion before you.

Session has met since then to hear a report from the team that met with Pastor Tiffany. Another meeting with the team has been scheduled for early February to further discuss her requests and Session's response.

Session has discussed, and will likely ask Presbytery to bring in an Administrative Council as a third party to meet separately with Session, members of the congregation, and Reverend McCafferty in order to determine validity around the previously mentioned allegations. This process could take as much as six months. Session will make efforts to keep our congregation informed.



"A Mountain of Light"

Montana de Lus, also know as "a Mountain of Light", is a faith-based organization dedicated to helping children, youth and families affected by HIV/AIDS in Honduras Our congregation has sponsored two children, Erick and Loida, for many years. Once again we hope to sponsor both of these children at Montana de Lus by contributing to the "50 cents a Day Jars." We have increased the amount to keep up with the higher costs of goods and services at Montana de Lus..

Today the majority of youth at the children's home are ages 15-20. The focus of Montana de Lus is to help them transition successfully into adulthood. Support and resources are provided to help them secure employment, enter university or reintegrate with their family. Younger children are still being helped, but in their family home setting or foster care.

The global Covid pandemic has forced Montana de Lus to pause and reassess its future. The Honduran government has ordered all children's homes to start transitioning towards a family-based care model. Transitioning out of institutional care and into life in Honduras is extremely difficult. The support of the family makes all the difference.

Montana de Lus is up to the challenge. Thus Montana de Lus' focus in 2022 is to invest in the families of the children being helped at the facility. Families will be able to come to Montana de Lus and meet the staff to get the support they need so that their child never has to be separated from them. Montana de Lus will provide meals, transportation and information to help these families cope with HIV/AIDS. The program is called "Healthy Families Honduras."

"Retool the Mountain" is a new project at Montana de Lus that will expand and upgrade it's programs and make needed repairs and upgrades to the facility. One program is offering training sessions in a refurnished computer lab.

Most families served at Montana de Lus are not computer literate. This program will help them in finding jobs that require workers to be confident when using a computer. Another program is to renovate the pharmacy to create a safe, better equipped area with expanded resources.

This year our hope is to once again help support Erick and Loida. Your donations will be greatly appreciated.

Per Capita: What's in it for me?

As a connectional church, our work is maintained, sustained and funded by a financial system called "Per Capita." In this system, each governing body above the local congregation's session determines how much it will cost to do what the Book of Order and the next higher governing council require. Each body also calculates what it will cost to do the ministries it believes God is calling it to do. And the General Assembly determines the cost of maintaining the structures and systems at the national level that support the internal work of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and its relationships with other faith communities around the world.

Has your congregation ever benefitted from Per Capita payments made to your presbytery, synod or the Office

of the General Assembly? Before you say no, let me ask you to consider the following questions:

What is Per Capita

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate and share in the work of the wider church. Per capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly, and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

- : It is how Presbyterians are trained to become better ruling elders, teaching elders and deacons, and ministers.
- : It is how Presbyterians are helped to discern God's call in their lives.
- : It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the wider church by serving on General Assembly committees and commissions, regardless of distance or financial resources.
- : It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the Church universal as we commit ourselves to work and live in fellowship with "all persons in every nation" (Book of Order, G-4.0101)

Has your pastor ever consulted with presbytery leadership for guidance?

Have you ever searched for a new pastor?

Has a member of your congregation sensed a call to ordained ministry and begun the discernment process?

Has your pastor or Clerk of Session referenced the Book of Order when your session is making decisions?

Have members of your congregation served as commissioners to the General Assembly?

Has a member of the Office of General Assembly staff ever attended your presbytery meeting to help interpret the church's work?

Have you read statements from our Stated Clerk, the Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II, about issues facing our world?

If you answered yes to any of those questions (and there

are many more), you and your congregation have benefitted from the dollars you have contributed to Per Capita.

Meanwhile, closer to home at the Presbytery of Lake Michigan

Andy Thorburn, church Elder, says that, locally, Per Capita pays several expenses at the Presbytery of Lake Michigan including salaries for General Executive Presybter, office manager, bookkeeper, and technical support personnel.

First Presbyterian Church of Paw Paw is one of 60 churches in the Presbytery of Lake Michigan.

Presbytery of Lake Michigan youth programs like Urban Plunge and Triennium, congregational growth programs, and new-church programs are all funded by Per Capita as well.

I have been playing at the Paw Presbyterian Church since October of 2006. I have so enjoyed being involved in services at church. And for all of the love, support, comfort, and kindness the congregation has shown to me over the years (especially after Steve died). My heart has been deeply touched.

I grew up with lots of music in the house. The folks had many, many 78's and I loved listening to them and so I am also familiar with many older songs.



From what my folks told me, I was very insistent on wanting to play the piano. So, they

asked 'Dump' Fredrick to find a good and reasonably priced piano. He found one for \$50.00! It had been a player piano, but the player parts had been removed. Anyway, after Dad reinforced the floor where the piano would sit, the piano made its way into our home. I named it Claude (don't remember why).

My first piano teacher was Mrs. Elsie Roach, the minister's wife. When she felt she'd taken me as far as she could, I switched to the organist/pianist. It was the same story with her, so I ended up with a wonderful but tough lady who actually had a degree in music education from Parsons College in Fairfield, IA. She was my instructor during my high school years and actually played organ for Steve's and my wedding.

Having grown up hearing, playing, and singing hymns in church since I was very young, I feel it gave me the advantage of knowing the lyrics to many, many sacred songs. Being able to recall those lyrics has also given me the opportunity to transfer the feelings those lyrics invoke to my singing and playing. The feelings just kinda bubble up and float out of me. Words are sooooo important!

I was born on June 26, 1952 in Fairfield, Iowa and I

grew up on a farm near Packwood, IA. Attended Packwood Elementary K-8 and Pekin High School. 9-12. My Dad was a Farmer and Carpenter and my mom was a Registered Nurse. I have one older sister, one older brother, and one younger brother.

I have been singing and playing piano since 6th grade. I attended grades K-8 at the Packwood Elementary School in Packwood, Iowa. During those years I sang my first vocal solo and played clarinet in 6th-8th grade. I also sang in a trio that would sing at different area events.

I played my first piano solo at church when I was in 6th grade. I also sang in the Ollie Baptist Church Choir in Ollie, Iowa and the Pekin Area Choir.

When I was at Pekin Community High School I participated in both the choral and instrumental programs. I was a member of the High School Mixed Chorus, Girls Glee, Madrigal, Chamber Choir, plus solos and ensembles, and accompanied the Boys Glee. I was also a member of the Concert Band (clarinet), Marching Band (played bass drum my senior yr.), Jazz Band, Pep Band, many ensembles and belonged to the Lyre Club. I also sang for many weddings, funerals, and other area events.

Since moving to Michigan in 2002, I have directed the Paw Paw Community Chorus and, for nine months, directed at church too. I've sang in the church choir. Since 2006 I've been a part-time pianist/accompanist at church.

I've also sung and played at area events and accompanied students at district and state festival solos. I'm also an instructor in voice and piano lessons.
