Supplies that are needed:



Please join us on December 1st at 7:00 as we explore the amazing faith journey of C S Lewis. After watching the movie, and enjoying our popcorn bar, Rev Gail Monsma will lead us in discussion.

The Most Reluctant Convert movie is based on a stage play. Like Ebenezer Scrooge traveling back in time to see his early life, the middle-aged Lewis (played by McLean) travels back in time to his childhood, teen, and young adult years, where he walks the same streets and visits the same houses and classrooms of his younger self. The Most Reluctant Convert is an inspiring tale about an atheist who was consumed by intellect and became the greatest defender of the faith of the 21st century.

The Most Reluctant Convert features award-winning actor Max McLean as the older Lewis and Nicholas Ralph — breakout star of PBS Masterpiece's All Creatures Great and Small — as young Lewis. Beautifully filmed in and around Oxford this engaging biopic follows the creator of The Chronicles of Narnia from the tragic death of his mother when he was just nine years old, through his

strained relationship with his father, to the nightmare of the trenches of World War I to Oxford University, where friends like J.R.R. Tolkien challenge his unbelief.

Written for the screen and directed by two-time Emmy and BAFTA winner Norman Stone (BBC's Shadowlands), **The Most Reluctant Convert** brings to life the spiritual evolution of one the 20th century's sharpest minds and keenest wits.


Save the date! December 1st at 7:00 pm in Fellowship Hall we watch **The Most Reluctant Convert** together followed by a group discussion. Join us.

The year has flown by, even though there were sometimes we felt as if it would never end. And now, here we are at the end of 2022 immersed in our Stewardship drive for 2023.

I'll admit that I have never served on a stewardship committee because I thought it was a money ask, and it also seemed like the single most boring thing I could ever do. This year as the Administration commission began to talk about Stewardship there were no raised hands when asked who would like to serve on the committee. Finally, Mary Ellen said she would do it again, after having chaired the committee five years in a row. That just offended my sense of what's right, and I said I would take it on. And I am so glad I did.

Stewardship is not dull, monotonous, or a "money" ask. Being on this committee has certainly not been boring, but very educational. Having this time at a table surrounded by really smart people is invigorating and hearing the stories of their faith journeys makes me realize that by being stewards of this church and all its programs is not really even a "money" ask, but a commitment we make to God to honor his promise to us to prosper us, and not harm us, give us hope and a future.

Stewardship is an every day promise that can be achieved by commitments of time, talents and tithes. It is not something that ends on Dec 18 th with the dedication of pledges, but a commitment we make to be stewards of our church home and each other 365 days a year.

The most common question about stewardship seems to be "how much should I pledge". I believe the best answer to this was written by C.S. Lewis who said,

"I do not believe one can settle how much we ought to give. I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare."
