

Greetings Friends in Christ,

This month we move into the liturgical season of Lent which will take us through Holy Week to Easter.

Lent comes from an Old English word, lencten to lengthen spring. Lent literally means the lengthening of daylight hours or the coming of spring. It corresponds with the Dutch word lente and the German word lenz or spring.

Here in Michigan, Lent takes place as we eagerly await more sunshine, warmer weather, and the budding and blossoming of Spring — new birth! Yet it is within these gray days in the season of Lent that we are called to recognize our humanity, our brokenness, and our need and yearning for a deeper relationship with something bigger than ourselves: the divine spirit of God. As we practice our faith during this season, we also get a foretaste of the brilliance of God's light and hope for the future in knowing that resurrection is coming.

Traditionally Lent is built around 40 days of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Forty is a special number in the Bible — it means a very long time. After 40 days and 40 nights of rain, God made a covenant with Noah to always be with us. After 40 days and 40 nights, Moses received the 10 Commandments on Mount Sinai and

his face shown for 40 more days. The Israelites wandered in the wilderness for 40 years eating manna and quail from heaven. Jesus fasted and was tempted in the wilderness for 40 days and 40 nights. Sundays, however, are not counted as part of the 40 days; rather, they are considered "little Easters," and one's "fast" can be broken on the Sabbath.

Lent is about transformation and renewal — it is about allowing God to mold us into something new as we seek to follow the path of Jesus Christ. Lent is meant to be a pilgrimage, a journey toward the cross with Jesus. We practice Lent so that we too might rise again on Easter morning as transformed people.

This year during Lent I'll be focusing my sermons on the practice of prayer, different types of fasting, and almsgiving — the giving back to God to bring about the Kingdom or Reign of God. We'll also be having Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday service times. Then watch for various Christian educational and spiritual formation opportunities.

So please journey with us during Lent as we discern how God might be calling you and me into a deeper relationship in the path of Christ and with each other.

On Sunday, January 8, we celebrated Epiphany by distributing Star Words and Frankincense. Did you receive yours? If not, please stop by the Church office and get your word along with a piece of frankincense candy.

Your Worship and Music Friends have been pondering our Star Words. Tom has his Star Word, conviction, displayed on his kitchen calendar. Marge has her Star Word, birthing, in her purse along with her Advent Stars. Catey put hers, opportunity, on the refrigerator. Where is yours? Do you think of it's meaning differently as the days go by?

Have you wanted to trade it in for a new one? Have you wanted to change your word, just a little bit? From responsibility to responsible or oneness to one? These Star Words will serve us as reflection points throughout 2023.



The use of Star Words, also called "star gifts," is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year that has been growing in popularity in Protestant churches for nearly a decade now. The idea is that a list of intention words, or guiding words, are written or printed on paper stars. These paper stars are then distributed at random. Individuals are often encouraged to place their star word where they will see it regularly throughout the year to allow consistent reflection on how God has moved through, around, or in connection to that word.


