### "HOW LONG, O LORD, HOW LONG?" --Habakkuk 1:2

It is nearing the end of April, and we have yet to hear whether the governor's "stay home" order will be extended or lifted. The number of daily confirmed cases of COVID-19 decreases and rises, and is still registering at a rate that is threatening the safety and functionality of our hospitals and health care workers. The future for small business owners looks bleak. Neighbors' views range from thinking we should stay in longer to advocating that we go back to business as usual.

Regardless of what our neighbors and our state lawmakers decide, we as a church will have to come up with our own way of being church and determining our "new normal," within all legal requirements, of course. When you picture returning to church for worship, what do you need to feel safe? How do you see the church functioning in the weeks and months to come so that all feel welcome to participate in various ways? What is our calling as church to foster and grow community in a world still vulnerable to unpredictable epidemics and disease?

The prophet Habakkuk lived at a time when corruption and evil threatened society. Habakkuk longed for a community that would behave justly and fairly, and cried out in despair to God while waiting for a "new normal" that never seemed to emerge. God's word to Habakkuk encouraged the prophet to turn not to false, empty idols, but to trust that the Lord would do as the Lord has always done, bringing glory and salvation to God's people. Habakkuk's lamenting turns to adoration, even in that moment of despair:

Though the fig tree does not blossom, and no fruit is on the vines; though the produce of the olive fails and the fields yield no food; though the flock is cut off from the fold, and there is no herd in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will exult in the God of my salvation.

---Habakkuk 3:17-18

Let us be the church that remembers the big picture of what God has done, that sees what God is doing, and encourages one another so that all may rejoice in the Lord!

# WHAT SESSION WANTS YOU TO KNOW

Our church Session continues to meet on a regular basis via Zoom. Since the time that we suspended in-person worship, Session has been committed to caring for our congregation, our community and our church staff.

At the March Session meeting, the elders voted affirmatively to continue to pay our church staff their regular salaries and benefits, and staff continue to do their jobs in some capacity, though for the most part, remotely. In April, Session again affirmed the decision to keep paying our staff through the extended shelter in place order.



Treasurer Dave Nielsen continues to work with Bookkeeper Joan Ford to keep the church's finances up to date.

As Treasurer Dave Nielsen reported in a video message last week, pledged giving for the first quarter of 2020 is slightly ahead of budget, and the trend in giving for the period during the shelter-in-place order is no different than the giving for the weeks prior to sheltering in. There has been a dip in unpledged giving and loose offering, understandably, along with an expected decrease in rent since outside groups are no longer able to use our church building. We hope to make up for this loss of income, however, by adding an on-line giving link to our webpage and social media posts.

Our 2019/20 Property Improvement Project (adding a new back entrance) was completed through Phase I just prior to the shut-down. The finishing touches on the interior of the vestibule include a modern gray-toned wood grain laminate floor and a soothing coat of light teal paint.



Thank you to the decorating sub-committee of Long Range Planning for creating this soothing, welcoming atmosphere in our new entrance.

The shutdown is not necessarily delaying Phase II of our project, which is the paving of the new parking area, as the ground has needed more time to thaw and settle. Once the paving companies are back in business, our Long Range Planning Committee will get updated bids on the parking lot and put a plan in place to complete the project.

# NEW WORSHIP SERIES GETS TO THE HEART OF THE MATTER

Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

-- Acts 2:46-47

For those first followers of Christ, being church meant engaging in intentional yet natural ways: spending time together, breaking bread, praising God, and having the goodwill of all the people. For the Easter Season (now through the end of May), we'll also follow those same moves in how we worship on-line and in our homes with a new liturgical format inspired by Dr. Marcia McFee of Worship Design Studio and her series, "The Heart of the Matter."

The Easter story sets the tone: After the events of Holy Week, the disciples are devastated. They are in the midst of full-blown grief and disbelief. Into the heart of that grief came a stunning revelation—life had overcome death. God's faithfulness would build them up once again and bind them together.

Is it possible to feel this way today? The way we worship in the coming weeks will say, "Yes, it is! Come and see! Live and love! This is the heart of the matter!"

With our new video worship format, you are invited to spend time together in the temples we create in our homes, with fresh flowers from the garden or family photos, painted rocks and candles and whatever else makes your space feel special. We'll break bread and be encouraged to have our breakfast or brunch while we worship (something we wouldn't do in the sanctuary!), and give thanks with glad and generous hearts for whatever feast we are able to muster in these oddly-stocked times. We'll praise God by hearing God's word and reflecting through song and prayer, and end each worship with an invitation to do something - a hug, a card, a prayer - to foster the goodwill of the people.

As Dr. Mcfee says, "It may feel odd to have moved into the season of Easter, a season of celebration, in the midst of these difficult times. Perhaps it is an opportunity to really take into consideration that, at the heart of our Christian faith, we are called to live our lives in the belief that death is not the final word. This is why Christians are called "Easter People." The tomb becomes the womb of new life. We cannot wait for everything to be alright to proclaim our Easter faith of resurrection hope. And so we, like so many Christians under duress since those first disciples, are invited to worship our everlasting God, and do what we can to help people continue to worship wherever they are.

# MISSION COMMISSION: REACHING OUT GLOBALLY AND LOCALLY

The Pentecost Offering has begun for this year. The monies raised help our youth by supporting young adult volunteers, ministries with youth and children at risk. These three comprise 60% of the monies received. The rest, 40% stays with our congregation to help develop and support our young people in the church and our community.

We have reached our goal for Montana de Luz. This year we raised over \$750.00 which will cover our donation to support Erick and Loida this year.

United Christian Services continues the work in providing emergency assistance while encouraging self-sufficiency in the greater Paw Paw area. Last year the organization provided over \$59,533.00 in financial assistance to people in need. This winter they provided over 850 winter coats through Operation Warmup. Help was given to over 1,173 families or 3,481 people. People came from all ages and special needs.
